

New Safety Lane Plans Set; Opens On November 30

The Oak Ridge Safety Lane on East Division Road will be opened Tuesday, November 30, for the semi-annual inspection of private vehicles operating in the Atomic City, it has been announced by G. E. Miller, of the Oak Ridge Public Safety Department.

Several changes in operational procedure are to be made at the Safety Lane for the imminent inspection period. For instance, the period of inspection has been extended from 30 days to 60 days, from November 30 to allow all operators of vehicles in Oak Ridge to obtain the required stickers that signify their automobiles or trucks are in safe operating condition.

To Indicate Waiting Time

For the convenience of motorists entering the Safety Lane, authorities will try out a system of erecting signs indicating the probable waiting time before the driver reaches the testing equipment. This also is an addition to the system in the past.

New hours of operation also will be placed into effect. The Safety Lane inspections will be given from 9:15 a. m. to 6 p. m. Tuesdays through Saturdays, with the lane being closed on Sundays and Mondays.

Emergency Brakes On List

Emergency brakes have been added to the items of inspection. Because of a shortage of emergency brake cables in the past, authorities have not insisted on the hand brakes being in perfect condition, but their shortage now is reported to have ended. Other parts of vehicles to be inspected include tires, foot brakes, headlights, tail lights, stop lights, steering wheel play, front wheel alignment, windshield wiper and horn.

Another innovation will be that of having attendants at the Safety Lane attach stickers to vehicles passing the inspections immediately after the cars are approved. All old stickers will be removed from the windshield at the same time the new ones are attached.

All motor vehicles operating in Oak Ridge more than one day each week are required to display the Safety Lane sticker unless they have stickers from approved safety lanes elsewhere.

Entertainment will consist of appropriate movies and carol singing and every young guest will be visited by Santa Claus, who will present the youngster with a stocking containing nuts, candy, apple, orange and a toy.

Individual tickets will be issued for each youthful guest and in an early issue of The Y-12 Bulletin an application blank will be published in which the parents will be requested to designate the number of tickets they will need for their families.

Y-12 Will Join Ridge Observing Thanksgiving Day

Employees of Y-12 will join those of other Carbide and Carbon Chemical Corporation installations in Oak Ridge and the city in general in observing the Thanksgiving Day holiday Thursday of this week, November 25.

Skeleton Forces To Work

In Y-12 no employees will be required to work on this date except for those whose presence at work is necessary to assure the continuous operation and protection of the plant such as the skeleton forces which are required to work on Saturdays and Sundays. Absences occurring on the days immediately preceding or following this holiday will not be excused except when written evidence is presented to the Division Superintendent indicating that unavoidable circumstances necessitated the absence.

The Atomic Energy Commission and the Roane-Anderson Co. also will observe all day Thursday as a holiday with the exception of operation of necessary facilities in Oak Ridge.

Post Office, Banks to Close

The United States Post Office will be completely closed all day Thursday and only special delivery letters will be delivered during the day. Banks also will be closed throughout the day.

Oak Ridge schools will close at the end of classes Wednesday afternoon until the regular opening hour next Monday morning.

Practically every business house in Oak Ridge, with the exception of drug stores, have announced that they will be closed all day Thursday. This includes groceries and general merchandising stores.

Special community Thanksgiving services will be held at 10:30 o'clock Thursday morning at the Chapel-On-The-Hill. The Rev. Henry Krouse Was Star Vol During 1934

"Tennessee should have beaten North Carolina or at least tied them this year.

"Too bad Hal Littleford's masterful gallop down the field had to be called back on account of a clipping penalty.

"The movies proved that it wasn't clipping, but what's the use. The game's over now and Carolina won."

The preceding remarks were numerous a few weeks ago after the Tennessee-Carolina clash at Shields-Watkins Field in Knoxville when the Tarheels dealt the Tennessee Vols a distasteful 14-7 defeat.

Brought Back Memories

The 1948 Vol-Tarheel gridiron clash and the ensuing post mortems undoubtedly brought back many memories to Henry Krouse, now a captain in the Y-12 Fire Department. For away back in 1934 Krouse was a backfield performer for the Tennessee team that handed a bowl-bound North Carolina team one of those so-called "stunning upsets" that rankle in the minds of players and alumni for years afterward.

Carl Snavely had just succeeded Chuck Collins as head coach at Chapel Hill and Collins left Snavely one of the most potent collegiate elevens in modern football history. The team was reeking with possibilities of the Rose Bowl bid even before the season started.

Henry Goes "All The Way"

Well, the Volunteers ventured over to Chapel Hill for the second game of the 1934 season. It was raining and the field was so muddy that the ducks were even walking. The Tarheels kicked off to the Vols. Krouse grabbed the ball and scampered 90 yards into pay dirt for Tennessee.

The Tarheels never recovered from the shock and lost the game, for their only defeat of the season, 19-7.

The story goes that Coach



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Reserve Officers' Air Unit Will Be Formed

Formation of an Air Force Reserve officer unit in Oak Ridge will begin soon with inactive duty training to be conducted locally under provisions of the Air Materiel Command Specialized Training Program, according to Lieut. Col. C. D. Gasser, of the NEPA project here.

Military Subjects Mandatory

Normal military subjects will be mandatory under the program and the following subjects will be available for selection by interested and qualified Air Reserve officers: Air Force Research and Development, Air Force Technical Intelligence, Air Force Procurement, Air Force Depot Maintenance and Air Force Depot Supply.

The training in Oak Ridge will be of the inactive duty type, with no consideration presently being given to two-week periods of active duty training with the NEPA project. The latter type training, two week periods, normally will be accommodated at the Wright-Patterson Air Force Base in Dayton, Ohio, or other appropriate bases falling under the Air Materiel Command.

May Commission Civilians

When present plans are completed, the names of interested Air Reserve officers located in Oak Ridge will be solicited for consideration. When the unit is activated here, consideration will also be given to commissioning in the Air Force Reserve certain civilian personnel who have qualifications especially applicable to AMC functions.

New Route To Replace Closed Sawmill Road

Sawmill Road, long a convenient short cut for Y-12 employees living in the eastern section of Oak Ridge in driving to and from work, has been closed permanently but will be replaced with a new highway that will provide better service for motorists formerly using the Sawmill Road.

More Direct Route Promised

According to Ernest Wende, assistant chief engineer of community construction and engineering of the Atomic Energy Commission, the new highway will leave the Scarboro Road near where the new Kerr Hollow Road intersects and runs parallel with the Midway warehouses and then turn north and extend to the Oak Ridge Turnpike at New York Ave. Wende reports this new road will provide a more direct route from Y-12 to the central and eastern portions of Oak Ridge than the Sawmill Road.

Bids on this new road were to have been opened last week and construction probably will be completed in about six months, Wende said.

Makes Room For Houses

The Sawmill Road was closed from its intersection with Scarboro Road at the railroad crossing near the outdoor theater to the Roane-Anderson Co. motor vehicle repair shops. The highway was abandoned to make room for construction of new houses, work on which has been started.

Henry 'Krouse The Mouse' Starred For U. Of T. Vols In 1934 Season

Snively brooded for many months over Krouse's 90-yard jaunt. That game was the beginning of a beautiful grudge between Snively and Coach Bob Neyland of Tennessee; two masterful coaches who have been fighting it out ever since.

Similar To McEver's Run

Snively studied night after night the moving pictures of Krouse's play. The Vols made sort of a lane for Henry down the center of the gridiron, cross-blocking just before the runner came up to them. It was almost a duplicate of Gene McEver's 98-yard run against Alabama in 1928. The whole maneuver, timed to a split second, was the result of hours and hours of tedious practice. It is said that Snively even made a trip to Knoxville to see a game after his season had closed just to observe Tennessee's blocking tactics.

The long jaunt down the field for Krouse might have been a carry over from the preceding week's game in which Krouse took the opening kick-off in the season's opener across the goal line after a 92-yard scamper. It was called back for "no score" as the result of a clipping penalty which placed the ball on the 40-yard marker and the Vols went on to win 14 to 0. So Krouse can easily sympathize with Hal Littleford.

Was Elusive Type Runner

Henry earned the nickname of "Krouse the Mouse" for his elusive, hip-shaping tactics. Krouse was the fleet type quarterback, fast, shifty and versatile as could be. He weighed only 166 pounds and stood five feet, 10 inches tall. He made a great record at the Memphis University School, a preparatory school, before coming to Tennessee.

Krouse carried the opening kick-off for a touchdown in his opening freshman encounter at Tennessee. It got to be a habit for Henry and he earned quite a name for himself on the Volunteer squad as a junior on the 1934 eleven.

Also Starred On Defense

Krouse also was tops as a defensive player. He averted an Ala-

bama tally in that same 1934 season when he smeared Alabama's Paul "Bear" Bryant, now head coach at Kentucky, with a savage tackle just as he was about to cross the goal, causing Bryant to fumble. The Vols recovered. However, the Volunteers dropped this one 13 to 6.

That was the same year that Alabama went to the Rose Bowl.

Henry later shined again against Kentucky when he made a dazzling 79-yard run, after taking Bert "Man O' War" Johnson's punt to Kentucky's four-yard line in the third quarter. The Vols rode the Wildcats to a 19 to 0 victory.

Dick Dodson, old Tennessee full-back, had this to say about Krouse after the Vols beat Louisiana State University 19 to 0 in the last game of the 1934 season and also Neyland's last game before leaving for his military tour of duty.

"Krouse was the greatest star in the game. His generalship was superb. He selected the right plays at the right time. He crossed the Tigers up coming and going and put the Vols very much in the game in returning kick-offs and punts."

Krouse returned the opening kickoff for 34 yards and later returned a punt for 37 yards.

Came To Y-12 In 1945

Krouse, who hails from Memphis, came to Y-12 in January, 1945. He worked with John Hughey, Chief of the Y-12 Fire Department, on the Memphis Fire Department for seven years.



Krouse has been very active in Y-12 athletic activities, starring in plant league games and on varsity teams as well as he did for his old alma mater.

Henry played on the championship Has Beens softball team in 1947 and 1948. He also played for the Y-12 varsity football team, the Robusters, and the Fire Department team in the plant league.

Headed First Aid Team

Another honor achieved at Y-12 was that of being captain of the Y-12 winning men's first team in the recent Oak Ridge annual first aid contest. The team was composed of Fire Department members.

Henry was a member of Sigma Phi Epsilon fraternity during his college days. He now lives at 105 Tomlinson Road in Oak Ridge.
