## Adrian Lawler, Son Of Y-12er, Wins Award Of Merit Physics Scholarship At Rochester

After an outstanding scholastic career at Oak Ridge High School — that started in kindergarten, grade and junior high schools of the city—a son of a Y-12 associate chemist has won a merit scholarship of \$1,000 per year for four years at the University of Rochester, N.Y. Adrian Lawler, 17, will major in physics at the University of Rochester; one of the

nation's leading educational institutions. The proud Y-12 father is R. G. Lawler, of Alpha Four Cascade Operations. The \$1,000 merit scholarship is the highest offered by the university for undergraduate studies. Adrian Lawler began his Oak Ridge schooling in kindergarten at Glenwood School, then went to grade school at Cedar Hill. He then stepped up to Jefferson Junior High School and Oak Ridge High School, where he will graduate with the class of 1958. In high school he has accumulated 21 credits. The son of the Y-12er has set his sights on a Ph.D. degree in physics and hopes to enter the nuclear physics field, his father reports. As a good start toward his chosen career, Adrian Lawler has had five years of science studies. At Oak Ridge High School he is a member of the Biology, Chemi-

sters and Modern Dance clubs. He also has been a member of the Choral Ensemble in his junior and senior years and was vice president of his junior class. He also was a member of the National Honor Society in both his junior and senior years and was secretary of the Hi-Y group in his junior year. This year he was a winner in both the Oak Ridge and Regional Science Fairs and also won an award in the 1957 Oak Ridge Science Fair. Last summer Adrian Lawler was selected as Oak Ridge's United Nations exchange student, spending the summer in Sweden. Other honors bestowed include an honorary science award by the Bausch and Lomb Co. in his senior year. He has been recognized by the Tennessee Academy of Science as being among the top 25 high school senior scientists in the state—and he has been selected by the Oak

## National Safety Council Award Of Merit Given Y-12 Plant For Accident Rate Reduction In 1957

**Excellent Performance Last Year Brings Honor**

More safety honors continue to be received by the Y-12 Plant—but still none are so good as the satisfaction-free day on the part of every Union Carbide Nuclear Company employee here means continued good health and happiness.

**Compared To Three Prior Years**  
The latest award received is the Award of Merit from the National Safety Council. It was awarded the Y-12 Plant for attaining such a significant reduction in percentage of frequency and severity of disabling injuries during 1957 in comparison to the three preceding years. The frequency rate is the number of disabling injuries sustained for every 1,000,000 man-hours of plant operation. The severity rate is the number of days of work lost per 1,000,000 man-hours of plant operations.

The National Safety Council's procedure for arriving at figures for the Award of Merit are to compare the Y-12 record for 1957 with the record for the three previous years and compare them with the mark for the chemical industry as a whole.

In 1957 the Y-12 Plant's frequency percentage was a low 1.22. The severity rate was 122 for the same year. For the 1954-1956 period the figures for the Y-12 Plant were 2.20 and 775. For this same period the rates for the chemical as a whole in safety were 3.73 and 535.

Then the National Safety Council adds the three-year records of the Y-12 Plant and the chemical industry and divides the total by two to obtain what it terms the "par" rate. This par rate is 2.97 and 655. So, comparing the Y-12 figures for 1957 against this par rate—the Y-12 Plant is 59 per cent above par for its severity rate and 81 per cent in frequency!

That's a fine achievement — and one that should inspire every Y-12er to — Keep those green lights flashing.

#### Starting Time Is 6:30 A.M.

Because of the expected big entry list, tee-off time has been set for 6:30 a.m. and close observance of a schedule being drawn by the Recreation Department is urged. All foursomes competing should call the Recreation Department before 4:30 p.m. Friday afternoon to schedule their starting times in the tournament. Every group is asked to be ready to tee off five minutes before their assigned starting time and if a foursome is not ready to start on time the next scheduled group will start and the tardy players placed at the bottom of the starting list.

To keep the tournament rolling along on schedule, all rules of etiquette of golf should be followed by all players. Golfers should proceed without delay and anyone hunting a lost ball should signal to following players to pass through and not continue until the passing foursome is out of range. Players should replace all divots and take precautions around the greens so that neither they nor their caddies damage the playing surface by careless handling of the flagstick or clubs. After holing out, players should proceed immediately to the next tee.

#### Same Prize Schedule Set

The same prize schedule of golf balls used in the Oak Ridge tournament will be used in the Deane Hill event. Awards will be made to the first four scratch and handicap players in four divisions and for the most and next most number of pars for 18 holes. The contestants will be divided into divisions according to handicap after play is started with one-fourth of the entrants being assigned to each division.


Greens fee for the Deane Hill tournament will be \$3.



Some Y-12ers might be confused by the headline over a story on Page One of the May 7 issue of The Bulletin (last week) pertaining to foreign travel by employees. The headline read that "Vacationers Need Not Report Foreign Travel." However, the Security Department points out, this pertains only to United States territories, Canada or Mexico. Y-12ers planning vacation or business trips to any other points outside the United States, such as Bermuda, the Bahamas or Cuba must report their intention of making such journeys as far in advance as possible with the Security Department. It is also required that any employees planning foreign travel anywhere outside the United States to attend an educational institution, on Company expense or be employed report their intention to the Security Department before departure.

In addition to the dancing and entertainment offered—three fine door prizes are to be awarded during the evening.


## H. F. Neubert, Sr., Rites Attended By Fellow Y-12ers


