North Portal Gravel Lot To Be Improved

With the opening on Monday of this week of the new Central Parking Lot with its accommodations for about 400 vehicles, work was started on improvement of the old gravel section of the North Parking Lot.

The plans call for surfacing the present gravel surface with chit, small stone, and then spraying it with a tar and asphalt mixture, providing a surface similar to that of the Central Parking Lot. This will provide a smoother surface than the old rough rock and prevent a lot of dust flying during the dry months.

The improvement project at the North Portal Parking Lot will require about two weeks and it is expected that the lot will be placed back in use about April 30.

Meanwhile, Y-12ers using the new Central Parking Lot were urged to comply with the traffic flow regulations published in a map in The Y-12 Bulletin last week. Angle parking and compliance with the directions on the map will greatly aid in handling traffic in the new lot and on Bear Creek Road.

Long-range plans provide for both the hard surfacing with asphalt of both the new Central Parking Lot and possibly the present gravel section of the North Portal Lot.

Keeping Address Data Correct Important

Plant And Employees Benefit By Accuracy

Keeping of complete, accurate and up-to-date information on home addresses and telephone numbers of every Y-12 employee as well as names and addresses of persons to be notified in case of emergency is essential to the efficient operation of the plant as well as important to the individual employee.

Needed by Shift Superintendents

Y-12 Shift Superintendents frequently are called on to call employees to work on emergency matters. In several recent instances, the Shift Superintendents have found it difficult to locate employees for these emergency calls because the addresses on file at the Shift Superintendents' office were wrong, telephone numbers had been changed or other vital information lacking.

It likewise falls on the shoulders of the Shift Superintendents at times to report injuries to employees to persons listed to be notified. It is just as necessary that these addresses be kept up-to-date as those of the employees themselves.

Close Check Is Urged

So for their own benefit as well as helping increase the Company efficiency in Y-12 operations, all employees are urged to check the addresses given on their cards on file at both the Employee Records Division of Wage Standards and the Shift Superintendents' office. If there is any doubt as to the facts, or if changes have been made, new cards should be filled out. The card, Form WCX-997, is a six by four-inch yellow card with space for all the needed information. They may be obtained from Supervision.

Not only are these cards important for the reasons previously given, but also on them is based the plant mailing lists for delivery of Company mail to all employees. This includes The Y-12 Bulletin and in many cases of complaints that the paper was not received can be laid to the fact that addresses had been changed or improperly given.

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Tightened Security Regulations Aimed At Shielding Information

Verbal Or Written Discussion Of Operations In Plant Or Outside Is Strictly Forbidden

A general tightening of the security programs in Y-12 and other plants doing contract work for the Atomic Energy Commission is taking place throughout the nation with specific orders that no information relating to any plant or its activities may be released except through established and authorized channels.

Federal laws and Presidential decrees specifically prohibit unauthorized release by any contractor for the AEC or their employees, by word of mouth or in writing, of any information concerning plant operations.

Y-12 personnel are particularly cautioned against giving out any information concerning:

1. Expansion programs.
2. New projects.
3. Changes in existing processes, equipment or buildings.

Directed Internally, Externally

The tightening of the security program in Y-12 relating to atomic energy work of any kind is directed both at internal discussion of classified information as well as the release of such material to outside circles unauthorized to receive it.

Y-12 and AEC security regulations have continually stressed that no classified information regarding work in the plant is to be discussed at any time with unauthorized persons. By unauthorized persons, it is meant that no discussion regarding work processes, plant operations, proposed new programs or buildings or similar information shall be carried on by any employee with another who is not directly connected with the project under discussion. This applies even if the employees are well acquainted—but in different departments and doing different types of classified work.

Naturally, anyone without AEC security clearance is considered a person not authorized to receive any classified information—both within the plant boundaries and, of course, away from the job.

Too Much "Guessing"

There has been considerable "guessing out loud" around Y-12 recently that may or may not have been damaging to security. This type of "guessing" conversations can be harmful and should immediately be stopped. No matter how innocent such conversations may be—some bits of information damaging to the security of the plant possibly could leak out to fall into unfriendly hands.

It is well known that through acquiring such small bits of apparently unrelated information enemy agents often have pieced them together to learn far more than the first leak disclosed.

Those leaks, or loopholes, may be small and apparently insignificant—at first—but they should be immediately plugged for the safety and security of the plant and every individual employee at Y-12.

Danny Berrier, of ADP, took low score honors by shooting a 39.



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ACS And UT To Present Interesting Program In Dedication Of New Dabney Hall This Week

Many Carbide members of the East Tennessee Section of the American Chemical Society, including several Y-12ers, will attend dedication ceremonies for the new Dabney Hall, the Department of Chemistry building, at the University of Tennessee April 23 and 24. The Chattanooga and Northeast Tennessee Sections of the ACS will join with the university in the dedication ceremonies, at which several nationally known speakers will appear on Friday and Saturday of this week.

The principal speaker will be Dr. Farrington Daniels, past president of the American Chemical Society and now with the University of Wisconsin. His subject will be "Future Sources of Energy." "Atomic Energy, Weapon For Peace," will be discussed by Dr. Hubert N. Alyea, of Princeton University. Other speakers will include Dr. Andrew A. Benson, University of California; Dr. R. S. Schreiber, vice president of the Upjohn Co., and Dr. Phillip W. West, of Louisiana State University.

Milestone in University Growth

The dedication of the new Dabney Hall marks a big milestone in the growth of the university's Department of Chemistry. The teaching of chemistry at the university dates back to 1820, when the institution was known as East Tennessee College. The importance and popularity of the subject resulted in the steady growth of the courses of instruction through the years and the continued need of added room for the work.

The original Dabney Hall at the university was occupied in 1929 after the Department of Chemistry had occupied various locations on the campus. The growth from hundreds to thousands of students taxed the facilities to the breaking point and the new addition to Dabney Hall was started in 1952 as a result of a \$1,000,000 legislative appropriation. It added 55,000 square feet of space to the 25,000 existing in old Dabney. The addition houses a modern laboratory, equipped by another \$200,000 legislative grant.

Program Draws Wide Attention

The importance of the topics selected for discussion at the dedication ceremonies and the importance of the addition to the university is expected to draw wide attention to the two-day program. The Friday night program provides for a dinner at the university cafeteria at 6:30 p.m., followed by Dr. Alyea's address at 8 p.m. in the Dabney Hall auditorium. An open house and inspection of the new facilities will follow the address.

In his talk, Dr. Alyea will trace the growth of ideas that led to the atomic bomb. He will discuss how scientists gradually came to understand atomic structure and isotopes, how to smash atoms and how nuclear energy finally was tapped. The work of the Manhattan Project in exploiting fission reactions and the contrast between ordinary high explosives

and the nuclear fission reactions also will be described.

H-Bomb Discussion Set

Dr. Alyea also will briefly describe the nature of the hydrogen fusion bomb after which he will point out the necessity of worldwide control of the devastating weapons and the many peace-time blessings that may come, instead, from atomic energy.

The dedication ceremonies for the new Dabney Hall will be held at 10:30 o'clock Saturday morning, with a symposium discussion set for 2 o'clock that afternoon. The symposium subject will be "The Impact of Chemistry on Related Sciences. Dr. Benson, Dr. Schreiber and Dr. West will participate in the symposium. Dr. Benson's topic will be "Tracing Metabolic Maps," in which he will stress the impact of physical and organic chemistry on biology in the past decade. Dr. Schreiber will speak on "Microbiological Oxidation of Steroids" and the development of some of the new and remarkable drugs. Dr. West's subject in the symposium will be "Spot Tests and Their Applications in Chemistry and Associated Sciences."

Dr. Daniels Concludes Program

The program will be concluded at 8 o'clock Saturday night at the Dabney Hall auditorium with Dr. Daniels' address on "Future Sources of Energy." He will point out that although the world now has abundant fuel in the form of coal, gas and oil for the immediate future, the world eventually will be looking to atomic and solar energy for power.


