Clark Center Park to open April 11

Clark Center Recreation Park, a popular recreational area with facilities for most warm-weather sports, will open for the season Monday, April 11.

The park, which is operated by Union Carbide Corporation for Nuclear Division employees and other residents of the Oak Ridge area, will be open daily from 8 a.m. to 11 p.m. until October 2. This is the second year that the Corporation has funded the operation of the park.

Clark Center Recreation Park was established in 1964, and thousands of persons utilize its facilities each year. There is a picnic area with 160 tables which can accommodate up to 600 people, in addition to a large, barbecue/shelter area. The boat-launching facility has parking space for about 70 vehicles, and the park also features two softball fields, another for badminton or volleyball, horseshoe-pitching pits, a canoe-launching area and a large beach and swimming area.



Savings Plan changes announced

The Corporation has announced improvements to the Union Carbide Savings Plan for employees. These improvements will take effect June 30, 1983, subject to approval by the Internal Revenue Service.

- All or any part of the June 30 payout of the General Savings Fund may be "rolled over" into the Personal Investment Account by those employees who are eligible to participate in the Personal Investment Account.

- The withdrawal, suspension and forfeiture provisions of the Personal Investment Account are liberalized.

- The amount of allowable Supplemental Employee Contribution is doubled, from 5 percent to 10 percent.

- The six-month ban on the purchase of Union Carbide stock following a sale is eliminated.

The "rollover" provision will, for the first time, permit the direct transfer of money from the June 30 General Savings Fund payout to the Personal Investment Account. Any of this money, which would otherwise be taxable as 1983 income, will not be taxed until withdrawn from the Plan.

Brochure describes changes

Employees will soon receive a brochure describing the changes and how they can be used to meet savings objectives. All employees should read it carefully and consider whether their present Savings Plan arrangements should be changed.

The June 30, 1983, changes to the Union

Carbide Savings Plan require additional clarification in the Nuclear Division because of the change in contractors, which is now expected to take place during the first half of 1984. Until a new contractor has been selected, and the benefit plans package it will provide in the Nuclear Division has been determined with the Department of Energy, it is not known whether or not a savings plan will be a part of the Nuclear Division benefit plans package.

Other possibilities

If a savings plan is part of the new contractor's Nuclear Division benefit plans package, it may be possible for an employee to transfer his or her monies in the Carbide Savings Plan to the new contractor's savings plan. If this cannot be done, or if the new contractor does not offer a savings plan as part of its Nuclear Division benefit plans package, it may be possible to transfer taxable monies in the Savings Plan, either from the General Savings Fund or from the Personal Investment Account, to an Individual Retirement Account in order to defer taxes on that amount. Such actions would be subject to Internal Revenue Service approval.

Even considering the uncertainties about the future, the "rollover" of the June 30 General Savings Fund distribution is tax-effective for 1983. The "rollover" decision is strictly personal and voluntary and each employee must decide whether or not it is in his or her best interest to elect it.


Funeral services were conducted at Greater Bush Grove Baptist Church, with burial in Camila, Ga.

Funeral services were held at Kyker Funeral Home in Harriman, followed by interment in the Swan Pond United Methodist Church Cemetery.


William D. Newman dies

Other activities



Organized successful talent show

Stewarts continue involvement with Cancer Society

When the curtain fell on Roane County's annual talent show a few weeks ago, not only had more than \$3000 been collected for the American Cancer Society, but the event had been renamed for its founder, Margaret S. Stewart, senior reports and data assistant in the Engineering Organization at ORGDP.

Stewart and her husband Ray, chief reproduction clerk in the Finance, Materials and Services Division at ORGDP, were instrumental in the organization of the first talent show, held in 1974. According to Stewart, the annual event, which has become the major fund-raising project of the Roane County unit of the American Cancer Society, is the "most-attended function held in the county."

Margaret and Ray organized the first show and have continued their involvement in the planning and public relations efforts for the program each year.

The Stewarts, who are Kingston residents, became involved in Cancer Society activities about 10 years ago, when fellow employee Jo Akers invited them to a meeting of the Roane County unit. They were impressed with the group and its programs, joined that very evening and soon were appointed to chair the unit's special events committee.

The idea of a talent show seemed a natural to Margaret. The Rockwood native began singing with her sisters at an early age, and the family group appeared on a Knoxville radio program when she was nine. She continued to perform during high school and beyond, and eventually formed a trio with other women from her church in Kingston. The group, the Kingstones, has performed all over the area and has appeared on local and nationally syndicated television programs.

Margaret and Ray organized the first talent show, held nine years ago, and have continued their involvement in the planning and public relations efforts for the program each year.

This year's show, held at Roane State Community College, featured performances by some fifteen groups or individuals and was attended by several thousand people. During the program, Margaret was presented a plaque in recognition of her years of service to the Roane County unit.

The talent show is not the only Cancer Society activity that has benefited from the Stewarts' efforts. Margaret has been involved in fashion shows, cookbook sales and other fundraising efforts, while Ray is a past president of the Roane County unit and former

chairman of the Roane County Cancer Crusade. Ray also has been active in the Lion's Club, while Margaret is a member of the Roane Choral Society.

Plans are now under way for the Margaret Stewart Tenth Annual Talent Show to be held next spring, and the show's originator is already involved in the effort. Although Margaret Stewart learned last August that she has cancer, the disease hasn't diminished her zest for living. And thanks to the efforts of the Stewarts and many others like them, there is now more hope than ever for victims of the disease.

Question Box

Why not cover weight-loss programs?

QUESTION: Why doesn't Blue Cross/Blue Shield cover weight-loss programs when Union Mutual does? What must salaried employees do to obtain this coverage, which is already available to hourly employees?

ANSWER: Coverage provided by Blue Cross/Blue Shield of Tennessee and Union Mutual is basically the same. Weight-loss programs are not covered under either plan. There may be cases when a medical condition such as hypertension, diabetes, etc., is treated in conjunction with weight loss. In these cases, benefits are payable for the treatment of the medical condition only, not for obesity.

Medic coverage for retirees

QUESTION: I am a Union Carbide retiree.

Am I covered under the Medic blood program?

ANSWER: Medic's program is normally limited to active employees and their dependents (as defined by Internal Revenue Service regulations). In view of the very favorable response in the Oak Ridge Nuclear Division installations, Medic has agreed to exempt from blood processing charges those retirees and their spouses who are under 65 years of age and still being covered by basic and major/special medical plans.


After age 65, a retired employee or his/her spouse can convert to normal Medic membership by donating blood with the approval of his/her physician. This, of course, would exempt such individuals from blood processing charges.
