## Proposed Action Description:

The National Nuclear Security Agency (NNSA) proposed action would install a new Perimeter, Intrusion, Detection, and Assessment System (PIDAS) section to reduce the Protected Area of the Y-12 National Security Complex (Y-12) by approximately 50 percent; eliminate the need to maintain the current PIDAS; effectively and efficiently ensure the protection of vital NNSA assets, thus continuing NNSA's nuclear security mission; facilitate cost-effective deactivation and decommissioning (D&D) of processcontaminated facilities; and reduce costs for operations outside the smaller Protected Area. The WEPAR Project would install a new western leg of PIDAS fencing (runs lengthwise along "H" road), upgrade security to buildings that would be located outside of PIDAS, upgrade PIDAS alarm sensors and security fencing, install a new vehicle barrier system, and install a new security post for vehicle/pedestrian entrance. The legacy PIDAS infrastructure west of "H" road (~1 mile) would be demolished and include the removal of fencing, sensors, camera towers, vehicle barriers, security posts, and the demolition vehicle/pedestrian entrance at Security Post #33. This revision (rev 3) includes: a clarification of security infrastructure upgrades to buildings and the project's demolition scope, the installation of mobile trailers to house subcontractor personnel for the duration of the project (reviewed under NEPA 4967), and the addition of categorical exclusion applied below.
